# Forty-three Cats Rescued from Single Household



On January 21st, PMHSKC staff members, accompanied by Animal Control Officer Robert J. Robinson were given entry to a home in one of our service towns to find dozens of cats living in deplorable and very unhealthy conditions, floors covered in feces and soaked in urine. Twenty one cats were humanely trapped that first day with another twenty two to follow, bringing the current total to forty-three. The "Ice Cats", as they have come to be called, were rescued during some of the most bone chilling temperatures we've had so far this winter. Although the cats had been receiving food on a fairly regular basis, they were living in the home with

no heat and had received limited human interaction for over two years. Sadly, as is often the case in hoarding situations, the owner started out with the best of intentions but became overwhelmed and unable to care for the numerous cats in her care. Often hoarders confuse their loving the animals with the reality of their inability to provide a safe, clean, and healthy home for them.

The Pope Memorial Humane Society of Knox County is located on 17 Buttermilk Lane in Thomaston. Dear Friends.

2012 was a banner year for the shelter, saving more lives and creating more families than ever before. Over fourteen hundred animals came through our doors needing help of some kind last year. Whether it be a call to a frantic owner that we have their lost dog, a place to go for a senior cat whose owner has passed and now needs a new home, an abandoned litter of kittens who needed to be bottled fed

or surgery and extensive rehabilitative care to a cat named Union who stole our hearts, we were there to help. We couldn't have done it without your support. Your gifts of time, needed supplies and financial contributions made it possible.



It looks as if 2013 will be no different. On the heals of receiving the forty-three "Ice Cats" in January, we received twenty-three animals in a suspected neglect case including two donkeys, one goat, seven chickens, three ducks, two dogs, six cats and two parakeets. We're starting to feel a bit like Noah's Ark here. We never know what the day will bring but whatever it does bring, we are here to help. We will continue to speak for those who cannot speak for themselves, care for those who have no one else to care for them, and love those who are unloved. "The owner of these cats did the right thing by surrendering them to the shelter and allowing us to help find them new homes" said Tracy Sala Executive Director. The cats are now safely being housed in the Cat Care Facility at the shelter, enjoying clean beds, fresh food and water, and human interaction. They have also received proper medical attention.

"Hoarding cases like these put a serious strain on our already full shelter and our resources." says Sala. "But we are committed to seeing that each cat gets a second chance at a good life." PMHSKC faced similar hoarding situations in 2007 when 43 cats were seized from a house in Rockland and again months later when it received 38 cats from a Warren home when it caught fire and burned to the ground.

As is also the case in most animal hoarding situations, very few



of the cats are spayed or neutered. Thanks to the generosity of Dr. Glen Yovino of Harbor Road Veterinary Hospital and his veterinary assistant Melanie, fifteen male *Ice Cats* were neutered and received their rabies vaccina-

no charge to the shelter. We are very grateful for the support and generosity of Dr. Yovino and his staff.

A handful of the cats are socialized enough to go up for adoption immediately, while others will take weeks if not months to rehabilitate. Many, who are not candidates for rehabilitation will find their second chance as barn buddies.


